
A Letter Purporting to Come from A. H. Lissak—A Probable Forgery.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ENTERPRISE.

In your issue of the 19th instant appeared a communication over my signature which, upon review and mature reflection, I deeply regret should have seen the light. From my impulsive nature I wrote quite thoughtless of the scope and effect of my remarks. It was foreign to my intention to cast odious reflections upon the House of which I have the honor to be a member, or upon the honor or character of any one of its members. Somewhat unaccustomed to the usages and intercourse of parliamentary bodies, I now cheerfully confess to my fellow members and to the public, to whom my remarks have unfortunately gone, that I did not properly appreciate their objectionable character. I have no disposition to make war upon the character and dignity of the Assembly, as by doing so I am fully aware I should be aiming a blow at the best interests of our young State. By the character of its public servants, it is well known, a State is judged abroad, hence, any act on the part of the public press, or of individuals in public position, which is calculated to depress that character, is a public wrong. I would not, deliberately, contribute to that wrong. My heart is with my State and steadily yearns for the advancement of its best interests. And now, seeing the error which it has been my misfortune to commit, I will ask you to insert this in your columns as an act of justice both to myself and those whom I have injured.

I desire to state further that my letter of yesterday was written hurriedly, and consequently, after some reflection upon the contents thereof I revised the same, and by mistake I sent the original copy.
